Standby generator considerations

Everyone has, at one time or another, been caught in a winter storm and the power goes out. Sometimes these outages only last a couple of hours, but others can last for days. The U.S. Energy Information Administration reports that customers in the U.S. go without power for an average of four hours per year. While this can be very inconvenient and unexpected for families, a standby generator can be a great solution to keeping your family warm and your home safe. If you're considering investing in a standby generator, here are a few questions to ask before buying:

Is a standby generator right for me?

Outside of the obvious inconveniences that come with being out of power, one main reason a generator might be right for you is if you're at risk of losing your personal property if the power fails. This might be frozen pipes during an outage, expensive food spoiling or necessary medical equipment working improperly. The best time to have a standby generator installed is before something like this happens to you.

Prioritize your power needs.

When the power goes out unexpectedly, what do you need to carry on with your basic daily functions? Some people install generators to keep the essential functions of their home up and running, such as the refrigerator, heat, and a few lights. Other people invest in a generator to continue functioning as if the power is not out. Before you invest in a standby generator for your home, decide what you'll use it for and what you can live without. The greater the size and use of the system, the greater the cost.

What size generator is adequate for me?

Generators supply a specific amount of power that can't be stretched. When talking with an electrician, make sure you request an NEC (National Electric Code) approved load calculation with the estimated cost of the appropriate size generator to meet your needs.

Know what you're buying.

Be sure to do some research and talk to an electrical professional about the type of standby generator you are buying.

Read reviews, and ask about their warranty and maintenance agreements.

What does installation involve?

You'll want to have a certified electrician install your new generator. The contractor will do a site survey, that will help determine generator placement at your home, so it's in accordance with local codes and ordinances. The location is usually located close to the home's incoming gas and electric line.

For the safety our Eastern Illini linemen, we ask that you don't connect a generator directly to your home's wiring as it can backfeed power into our distribution lines. An electrician should install a double-throw transfer switch. Also, never plug a generator into a household outlet as that can also backfeed power.

Remember: Knowledge is Power

Standby generators are designed to protect your biggest investment: your home. Take the time to get accurate answers regarding your system to keep your family safe.

Homer Lake: A hidden jewel



As the weather begins to warm and the grass turns green, you'll want to consider visiting Champaign County Forest Preserve District's Homer Lake. Tucked away in the corn and bean fields about 2 miles south of Ogden is a hidden jewel where wildlife and natural beauty abound. Homer Lake Forest Preserve offers 814 acres that create experiences of engagement and exploration in nature.

There's something for everyone at Homer Lake. Climb on logs and jump off rocks at the Natural Playscape. Stop by the Interpretive Center and view live animals, engage with interactive exhibits, and learn about

events like The Owl Prowl. The wide array of birds at Homer Lake makes for fascinating viewing. Fishing and boating are also popular activities along with hiking on the 10 miles of trails that cross grasslands, prairies, and woodlands. Homer Lake staff aim to connect people with nature. On any given day, employees make presentations to school groups, 4-H clubs, scouts, and Interpretive Center visitors. No two days are the

same and that's what makes the job fun according to those who work at Homer Lake. Many appreciate watching the changing seasons in a natural setting. Seasons in which nature flourishes and grows, changes colors, and prepares for the coming cold, hibernates, and waits patiently, then bursts forth with new growth and new life.

The Champaign County Forest Preserve District encourages everyone to get outside and embrace nature. Homer Lake is a great place to host a family reunion, enjoy a picnic on a Sunday afternoon, catch a crappie, and soak up the sun and surroundings. One visit to Homer Lake and you'll want to come back again and again!

Homer Lake Forest Preserve has several significant historical connections. The county highway bordering the north end of the preserve was the horse trail Abraham Lincoln traveled when he served on the 8th Judicial Circuit. A Looking for Lincoln wayside exhibit now marks the location. The preserve also includes the 14-acre site once known as Old Homer Park, a popular "destination park" on the Salt Fork River in the early 1900s. It was purchased by W.B. McKinley. In 1905, C.B. Burkhardt leased and started Homer Park.
