the larger community safe.

had a record number of responses totaling over 1,400. Overall, members rated their cooperative very highly, with a score of 87 (out of 100) on the member satisfaction benchmark. Additionally, member ratings for employee interactions ranked very high (95 or above) in most every category. Members also identified areas for improvement. We use this annual member feedback to continually strive to improve service and to create a positive experience for members.

As previewed in detail last month in PowerLines, the return of capital credits to members totaling approximately \$1.1

million is in process. The mailing of checks began the week of Thanksgiving for members active during the years of 1996, 1997, and 1998. The return of member equity in the form of capital credit payments is a tangible investment return which is unique to the cooperative business model.

Your Board of Directors recently voted to return a portion of the 2021 net operating

margins to members as a margin credit in the December usage bills

(next month). This will provide some assistance to members during the holidays in the continuing abnormal COVID-19 times. We will provide additional details next month, but the estimated total credits are expected to be more than \$900,000.

SHARING SUCCESS GRANT FROM EASTERN ILLINI AND COBANK

Vets and Cowboys receive \$5,000 grant



Eastern Illini Electric Cooperative along with CoBank, awarded Vets and Cowboys a \$5,000 Sharing Success Grant to continue their mission of providing training about horses and ranching to Veterans and minorities who can benefit from skills, new job opportunities, and exposure to the care, feeding, and riding of horses.

Vets and Cowboys is located at the former Lou's Route 1 Auction in Watseka. David Anthony is CEO and Sharon White is CFO.



Ten acres for their endeavor was purchased from Lou in 2014. An adjacent 89 acres of wooded area was purchased in 2020.

There are usually between 18 and 20 horses on the property at any given time. Some are boarded and some are used for racing. Vets and Cowboys has recently begun a breeding program as well.

Many of the horses are part of the training program that teaches job skills to those who attend training sessions. A unique feature of the training session held on the




property are individual cabins used by attendees. The cabins eliminate the need for hotel rooms, save on travel time, and provide a get-away at the end of a long day of learning. The future plans include moving the cabins to the recently purchased wooded area.

In June of 2020, Vets and Cowboys was awarded a State of Illinois grant to support minority-owned businesses across Illinois. The money was used to build a stable and horse stalls, training facilities, fencing, an arena area, and purchase equipment.

The vision of David and Sharon is to expand Vets and Cowboys to provide therapeutic horse back riding classes, drone services, and camps for kids from metropolitan areas who may have never been to a ranch or farm.

Eastern Illini's contribution to the Sharing Success Grant was matched by CoBank. Sharing Success was established in 2012 to celebrate the International Year of the Co-op. Together, CoBank and its customers have provided more than \$56 million in support to charitable organizations.

DECK THE HALLS SAFELY

Make safety a tradition this holiday season

There's nothing like putting up lights and decorations to get you in the holiday spirit. It's something that many do each and every year without incident, yet the holidays are also one of the most hazardous times of the year when it comes to electrical fires and accidents. Here are several tips as you deck the halls this season:

- When decorating outside, look up and around for power lines. Never throw light or other decorations into trees near power lines.
- Keep ladders, equipment, yourself, and your family at least ten feet from all power lines.
- Match plugs with outlets. Do not force a three-pronged plug into an extension cord or two-pronged outlet.
- Outside, use only lights, cords, animated displays, and decorations rated for outdoor use. Follow the

manufacturer's instructions on how to use them. Ensure outdoor outlets or extension cords are equipped with Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters (GFCIs).

- Never string more strands of lights together than recommended by the manufacturer.
- Do not staple or nail through light strings or electrical cords. Use plastic or insulated hooks to hang lights.
- Do not attached cords to utility poles.

The outside of your home is not the only place where you need to be cautious regarding electrical dangers. Also be careful when placing and decorating trees inside your home. The best decorations are safe decorations.

• Avoid running electrical cords under rugs or furniture. This is not only a fire hazard, but a tripping hazard.

- Place fresh-cut and artificial trees away from heat sources such as registers, fireplaces, and radiators. Remember to water fresh-cut trees frequently.
- Always turn off your lights and decorations when you leave your home and when you are sleeping. Most deadly fires happen while people are asleep.
- Be mindful of how you are using electrical outlets. If you're using extension cords that add receptacles, consider having a qualified electrician add more outlets to your home. Extension cords are a common cause of home fires.
- Keep decorations at least three feet away from heat sources. And remember to blow out your candles and turn off your fireplace when you leave the room or go to sleep.
